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Nitrous Oxide Sedation is a safe and effective technique



Service Spotlight: Nitrous Oxide Sedation

Nitrous oxide, sometimes referred to as “laughing gas”, is commonly used as a safe and effective sedation technique in dental offices to relieve pain and anxiety during dental treatment.

The gas is administered through a rubber mask placed on the nose of the patient. The patient will initially begin breathing 100% oxygen and Dr. Hammerlee will then increase the amount of nitrous oxide delivered until the appropriate dose is achieved.

The patient will begin to feel a pleasant level of sedation in anywhere from 30 seconds to 3 minutes and nitrous offers the flexibility of allowing Dr. Hammerlee to adjust the level to your comfort. The cheeks and gums of nearly one-third of patients will become numb. At the end of treatment, he will then return to delivering 100% oxygen to the patient for approximately 3-5 minutes, when all of the effects of the sedation are usually reversed.

Nitrous oxide sedation is a safe method with very few side effects. Higher doses may cause nausea in some patients, and obstructed nasal passages can interfere with the inhalation process. Unlike pharmaceutical sedatives, you can drive yourself to and from your dental appointment and you will not feel groggy after. It is highly effective in relieving mild to moderate anxiety and can even eliminate, or at least minimize, gagging sensations.

Characteristics of a well-fitted mouthguard

- Protective
- Comfortable
- Doesn't interfere with breathing/speaking
- Good retention—stays in place.
- Able to wear with orthodontics
- Sufficiently thick in critical areas
- Does not cause gagging, not too bulky
- Tasteless and odorless
- Tear resistant, durable

Children’s Dental Health: Mouthguards

Each year, there are 15 million dental injuries in the US and research shows that approximately one third of those are related to sports injuries. Mouthguards can greatly reduce these injuries, as well as their severity by cushioning a blow to the face or mouth during team or individual sports. It can pre-

vent broken teeth and injuries to the lips, tongue, face and jaw.

The American Academy of Pediatric Dentistry recognizes that there are three types of mouthguards that are available. These are; stock or preformed (ready-to-wear), mouth formed, and custom fitted. Without question the custom - fitted appliance

which is made by a dentist is also the preference of athletes when they have been surveyed. When this is not available the mouth formed mouthguard is preferable to the stock or preformed mouthguard. Any mouthguard that is used will only be effective if it is properly fitted and properly worn.

Prevention Is The Key: Oral Cancer

This year alone, more than 30,000 Americans will be diagnosed with oral cancer and 8,000 will die of the disease. More common than leukemia, Hodgkin's disease, and cancers of the brain, liver, bone and stomach, and is typically caused by long-term use of tobacco products, alcohol, and human papilloma virus (HPV) infection. Oral cancer is a major cause of death and disfigurement in the United States, according to the National Cancer Institute (NCI).

Approximately 75% of all oral cavity and pharyngeal cancers—mouth, tongue, lips, throat, parts of the nose, and larynx—are attributed to the use of smoked and smoke-less tobacco, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC). Those who choose to use cigarettes, cigars, pipes, chewing tobacco, snuff, and/or bidis (cigarettes from India that come in a variety of flavors and con-

tain less tobacco than regular U.S. cigarettes, but have three times more nicotine and five times more tar) place themselves at a much higher risk of developing oral cancer and other diseases, such as heart disease and chronic obstructive pulmonary disease (COPD)—a term used to describe emphysema and chronic bronchitis. Studies also have linked chronic alcohol use to oral cancer. Researchers believe that chronic alcohol use, combined with the use of tobacco products, multiplies the risk. In addition, sun exposure is a risk factor for lip cancer.

According to CDC, oral cancer occurs twice as often in males as in females. This is considerably different from the 5:1 male to female ratio of 40 years ago. Increased tobacco use among women is the main reason for the changes in cancer rates compared with the rates in the 1950s. Age is also a factor; 95%

of oral cancer occur in persons over the age of 40, with 60 being the average age of diagnosis.

In its early stages, oral cancer can be treated in up to 90% of cases. However, if the cancer goes undetected, it can spread to other parts of the body and become more difficult or nearly impossible to treat.

The oral cancer screening—head and neck exam—is one of the most critical components of a routine dental hygiene and dental exam. Dental hygienists and dentists can alert patients to suspicious growths and changes, noted during head and neck exams, and urge them to seek medical care.

Signs and symptoms of oral cancer can include:

- Sores that do not heal
- Lumps on the lip or in the mouth or throat
- White or red patches on the gums, tongue, or lining of the mouth
- Unusual bleeding, pain, or numbness in the mouth
- Sore throats that do not go away, or a feeling that something is caught in the throat
- Difficulty or pain with chewing or swallowing

Q & A: Do your sealants contain BPA?

No. Bisphenol A, commonly referred to as BPA, is a controversial substance used to make certain plastics and epoxy resins. BPA is an endocrine disruptor, which can mimic the body's own hormones and may lead to negative health effects. There have been various studies done on this substance worldwide, and many contradict each other.

While research continues, there have been many government and industry responses. The EPA considers it a "chemical of concern at this point, while the U.S. Department of Health & Human

Services released information to help parents to reduce children's BPA exposure. In September 2010, Canada became the first country to declare BPA as a toxic substance and in the European Union and Canada, BPA use is banned in baby bottles. Many countries as well as US states have proposed or are in the process of BPA restriction legislation.

Dental sealants are routinely applied to children's teeth to prevent cavities. While nearly all of these sealants contain BPA, there is one exception: Embrace
